As the design process for the new Jefferson High School building progresses, community input continues to play a key role in shaping the vision. Feedback from participants at October's workshop covered a variety of aspects, from the exterior and interior design to site programming and cultural placemaking. The input heard reflects a broad and shared desire for spaces that foster school pride. celebrate diverse heritages, and create a welcoming environment for all.



# Key Findings + Overall Themes

**Developing the Exterior** Participants suggested making the main entry more prominent with bold signage or a canopy. They were excited about the blue stair and the vibrant internal activity visible from outside. Opinions on materials and colors varied, but most favored options that showed contrast and depth, such as black brick or a red brick with black metal panel for added contrast.

Surveying How Space Feels. The interior team conducted a color exercise using regional imagery to develop interior palettes. A survey gathered input on what makes a space culturally affirming, bold, and welcoming. Respondents favored school pride and cultural affirmation, with suggestions to incorporate local elements and avoid generic, sports-focused designs.

Paving The Way, Brick-By-Brick. Community members liked the blue track and JHS logo on flags. They emphasized the importance of gardening programs, community involvement, and a Pacific Northwest landscape with medicinal/indigenous plantings. The landscape team had productive discussions on site programming, amenities, and the building's phasing and location.

Celebrating Jeff's Diverse Heritage. Participants were enthusiastic about cultural placemaking installations that foster reflection, with a focus on dynamic colors, shadows, and representing the heritage of Black, Indigenous, Latine, and Asian communities in Portland. They appreciated narratives celebrating JHS alumni and the Timeline of Excellence.



Overall, the space was seen as bright and inviting, with natural light and a flexible layout. However, some felt it was too cluttered or lacked comfortable seating, and while it was praised for being suitable for those with sensory issues, it wasn't universally seen as welcoming or relaxing.

This space eliciated mixed reactions; while the bright colors and sunlight were appreciated, the space felt too rigid, cold, and industrial for some. It was considered practical for dining but lacking warmth, with a need for more art and comfortable, varied seating to make it feel more inviting and less isolating.

People found the space to have a somewhat "college-like" feel, with comparisons to places like PCC. While the openness and high ceilings create a welcoming and grounded environment, some felt the space lacked warmth or vibrancy, describing it as dull. The design's openness was noted as beneficial for socialization, but not visually interesting.

The wood elements were generally appreciated for adding warmth and a welcoming feel. The strong overhead lighting was seen as calming and orienting, though a bit too bright or jarring for some. While the openness and potential for student art were positive features, some felt the space was too bland or stark.

The space is appreciated for its cozy, warm atmosphere and informal feel, with options like different seating heights creating varied work zones. The outdoor view and proximity to nature, along with natural light and plants, are highly valued. While the mix of colors is nice, concerns include the chairs potentially getting dirty quickly.

The space's openness is appreciated and many felt it resembled a high school or PCC. The lower level feels darker and unwelcoming, with transparent guardrails making people feel "on display." The seating layout is interesting but unclear in purpose. While dispersal is good, less color makes the space less engaging.

#### **CULTURALLY AFFIRMING**




























While the space isn't fully culturally affirming, adding school-specific branding and a focus on the mascot could foster shared culture and school pride. A giant mascot-themed design, incorporating arts and other activities, would be impactful. The current look feels generic and bland, with some thinking it leans too much on sports.

The railing design could be significant and would be enhanced by incorporating African or local indigenous patterns. Replacing word-centric elements with art that sparks discussion is preferred. The space feels lived-in and welcoming, celebrating diverse cultures loudly. Emphasizing student art and varied cultural representation is appreciated.

The wall art is affirming, but some elements feel off, such as the flag, which comes across as trite and reminiscent of an airport. The design feels boilerplate and could benefit from a clear value statement that highlights culture. Slogans seem performative and forced, lacking genuine connection.

The use of color is appreciated for its bold and vibrant presence. While it adds energy, the rainbow design feels somewhat generic, corporate, or even childish, lacking uniqueness. The playful, Lego-like aspect is enjoyable, but some feel it could be more specific to avoid seeming like it could be anywhere.


The idea of incorporating Jefferson's history is appealing, though famous faces may feel overdone and too easy. The space's scale is undeniable, but some find the design reminiscent of airport walls. Featuring local leaders would be more engaging and relevant than generic celebrity faces.

This design is a favorite, with the suggestion to incorporate local national tribal art to make it more meaningful. However, the space feels too dark and cold, lacking warmth and vibrancy.

#### FEELS LIKE A HIGH SCHOOL




The green color scheme in the servery, along with the other materials, feels cold and overly sophisticated, giving off a more airport-like vibe. The space also evokes mall food court feelings, lacking warmth and character, which detracts from a more inviting atmosphere.






Safety should be a key consideration in the design; while windows in classrooms are desirable, providing blinds would help address privacy, distraction, and security concerns. The color scheme feels school-like, but the abundance of glass limits personalization. More room for personal items like fliers or work would enhance the space's functionality.





The space has a less polished, more active feel, which helps avoid a corporate atmosphere. The mixed tables add interest, and the natural light gives it a modern, school-like vibe. While it feels dynamic, some found it sterile, even comparing it to the experience of eating a sandwich in prison, suggesting a desire for more warmth or character.






Thought this generally felt like a high school to most respondents, the backless cloth chairs are not favored, and there's a strong desire for more books, murals, and color. One noted that it resembles McDaniel, but with blue couches instead of red. There's concern that students might toss things over the rail.





The space feels like a high school, but not in a way that's necessarily appealing. The furniture and subdued colors are considered uninspiring, giving off a school-like vibe, but not engaging enough. There are questions about whether it's more suited for a cafeteria or classroom, with the overall feel being too reminiscent of a traditional high school.





The neutral color palette feels too sophisticated and designer, making it harder for teenagers to feel like they belong or can express themselves. While some wish their high school looked like this, others find the atmosphere more reminiscent of a hospital, lacking the vibrancy and comfort for a youthful environment.

#### **FEELS BOLD**























The design is bold, but may not age well over time. There are concerns about backless chairs and booths, especially regarding comfort and weight. The color scheme is a bit bold, but the design itself is less so, offering a cool way to define spaces. The space benefits from lots of openness and natural light, creating a welcoming atmosphere.

The bold color is appreciated by some, though others felt it may be too intense and that so much glass could be distracting while walking down the stairs. The futuristic, architectural gesture is loved, but the overall blue tone felt like it could appears dated over time.

The bold color is a bit much for some, but the inclusion of space for individual art makes it feel more personal and, with some noting that this is what a learning environment should feel like. The design brings energy to a smaller space like a corridot, with bright walls and bold colors that help student contributions to the environment stand out.

The open concept is appreciated for its feel, though the space is described by some as subtle, sophisticated, and not bold. The glass guardrail is a concern. While the design is modern and the large open space is loved, the neutral colors make it feel more corporate and too clean, lacking the energy typically associated with high schools.


The space feels classic with wide, open areas that allow for strong school identity and color. The use of supergraphics and large lettering is appreciated for adding personality and heart to the space, with the bold font helping to reinforce the school's identity. Some aspects, however, feel most suited only to a gym and not other areas of a school.

The way the screen interacts with light is liked, with suggestions to incorporate African or indigenous shadow patterns for added depth. The light and shadow effects are cool, though some felt it was more detailed, rather than bold. While some find it a bit too busy, the idea of using light to create patterns is highly appreciated.





